

I completed this bracelet about a year ago and I love how it turned out. My leader, Pat Hitchner, gave each of us a faux leather bracelet ready made with little holes for cross-stitch. The bracelet came with some patterns to choose from and I especially liked the chevron pattern. I used different colours of thread to fit my style and I attached another snap to make it smaller to fit my wrist. It turned out great! Just a note on a great technique - use sticky backed felt on the back of projects instead of stitching the felt on. Sticky backed felt can be found at most craft or dollar stores.



### LEARN A NEW STITCH ... PEKINESE STITCH


Work back stitch by following Diagram 1, coming up at 1, down at 2, up at 3, down at 4, etc. Stitches 1 and 4 share the same hole; stitches 3 and 6 share the same hole; etc.

Interlace the back stitches with thread that is a tone or two lighter or darker or with thread of a different colour by following Diagram 2. The stitch is shown open, but the loops should be pulled slightly when working so they lie next to the back stitches.

This stitch can be used as a filling or outline.

### PUMPKIN AND GHOST POCKET PLACEMAT



### **Pumpkin Pocket Placemat**

Black mesh placemat from the dollar store, or any placemat Scraps of Orange, Brown and Green felt Kreinik Fine #8 Braid in 015 Chartreuse, 012 Purple and 032 Pearl Sharp embroidery needle with large eye Needle threader Orange sewing thread or Treasure Tape 1/4" roll

### **Directions**

Draw a free-hand pumpkin on paper to use as a template. If you don't want to draw, look for a pumpkin template online or from a child's coloring book. Following your pattern, cut out a pumpkin (orange felt), a stem (brown felt) and a leaf (green felt).

Using the Kreinik braid and a blanket stitch, outline each piece: pumpkin first, then the stem (attach as you stitch), then the leaf (again as you stitch). You can use green to outline the pumpkin, purple to outline the stem and pearl to outline the leaf or use one colour for all blanket stitches.

Attach the pumpkin appliqué to the placemat with small hidden stitches using plain orange sewing thread. Leave an opening at the top so you can insert silverware into the pocket. If you want the appliqué to be temporary, use Kreinik Treasure Tape 1/4 inch roll to attach the pumpkin pocket.

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### **Directions**

Needle threader

**Ghost Pocket Placemat** 

Scraps of Grey and Black felt

Sharp embroidery needle with large eye

Grey sewing thread or Treasure Tape 1/4" roll

Draw a free-hand ghost on paper to use as a template. If you don't want to draw, look for

a ghost template online or from a child's coloring book. Following your pattern, cut out a ghost (grey felt) and two eyes (black felt). Using the Kreinik pewter braid and a blanket stitch, outline the ghost. Add the eyes by

ghost using Kreinik grapefruit braid. You can also use one colour for all blanket stitches. Attach the ghost appliqué to the placemat with small hidden stitches using plain grey sewing thread. Leave an opening at the top so you can insert silverware into the pocket. If you want the appliqué to be temporary, use Kreinik Treasure Tape 1/4 inch roll to attach the ghost pocket.

Kreinik Heavy #32 Braid in 003 Red; 005HL Black Hi Lustre
Kreinik 1/8" Ribbon in 100HL White Hi Lustre, 021 Copper
DMC embroidery flss in 3818 Ultra Dark Emerald, 3032 Mocha Brown
Tacky glue


Tacky glue Seed beads: 5 red







LADYBUG: 6 X 7 HOLES

— Heavy Braid 003

— Heavy Braid 005HL

- MUSHROOM: 12 X 12 — 1/8" Ribbon 100HL
- DMC 3032
- Beads

WHAT IS A FROG'S FAVOURITE HOT DRINK?

If you don't want to use the braids, use 6 strands of embroidery floss in your choice of colours.

### Instructions

Cut canvas according to graphs and as follows: **Base:** 18 x 18 holes **Background:** 16 x 16 holes **Mushroom:** 12 x 12 holes **Ladybug:** 6 x 7 holes

Using 6 strands of DMC 3818, work the background piece completely in continental stitches. Overcast the edges.

Work the mushroom in 1/8" ribbon 100HL in continental stitches. Using three strands of DMC 3032, add cross stitches as indicated. Matching colours, overcast edges of mushroom with White Hi Lustre, one stitch per hole and 2 stitches per hole of 3032.

Holding background piece like a diamond, tack top and bottom edges of the mushroom to the background, 1/2 inch from the top corner, with White Hi Lustre 1/8" ribbon.

Using Red Heavy Braid in continental stitches and Black Hi Lustre Heavy Braid in cross and back stitches, work ladybug. Matching colours, overcast the edges. Tack the left side of the ladybug to the mushroom and the bottom right side of the ladybug to the background with red Heavy Braid.

Using three strands of DMC 3818, whipstitch the background to the unstitched base, leaving one hole around all edges.

Overcast edges of base with Kreinik 1/8" ribbon in 021 Copper.


Glue five red seed beads to the top of the mush-room at  $(\cdot)$ . Glue backing material to back of pin. Glue pinback to centre of backing material.

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### KLOSTERS GALORE BISCORNU

### KLOSTERS GALORE BISCORNU, CONTINUED ...

### **Materials**

- 1—25ct or 28ct evenweave fabric (i.e., linen, Lugana, etc.), 7" x 12"
- 1—ball or skein #8 perle cotton, white
- 1—ball or skein #8 perle cotton, pink or your choice of colour
- 1—ball or skein #8 perle cotton, green or your choice of coordinating colour
- 2 buttons, coordinating with fabric and threads
- 1 tapestry needle, size #22 or #24

Polyester fibre fill

### **Directions**

Overcast edges. Fold fabric in half widthwise so it measures 6" x 7". Mark centre. Backstitch over 2 threads the pink line per the chart on each half.

On one side, stitch corner klosters and centre klosters. Stitch pink stars on each side. Stitch corner eyelets in the middle of the klosters and in the centre klosters.

On second piece, stitch corner klosters and corner eyelets in white only.

### Making the biscornu

If needed, wash the fabric and press. Cut each piece 1/2 inch from the backstitched line.

Fold under the 1/2 inch seam allowance and with wrong sides together, match one corner of the top piece (A) to the middle of one of the sides on the bottom piece (B). Using one strand of matching #8 perle cotton, overcast stitch the edges together through the backstitches. If you like, put on one seed bead with each stitch. When you get to the middle of the side on the top piece (C), swing the top piece around so (D)

matches up with (E).

Top

Overcast stitch around seven sides, leaving one side open. Stuff with fibrefill. Do not overstuff as you need room to attach the buttons to make an indentation. Overcast last side closed. Sew two buttons, one on each side, in the middle of the biscornu with perle cotton. Pull the buttons together so an indentation appears in the middle.


