THE MAPLE LEAF FOREVER ...

This year, celebrations across the country commemorate Canada's 150th Anniversary, so what better way than cross stitching a Canadian Maple Leaf on gingham.

Every cross represents a cross stitch in that square.

When stitching on gingham, pick the block colour you will start cross stitching in. Starting on different shade square in the gingham will change how your leaf will appear.

Remember all the bottom half cross stitches MUST go the same direction and all the top half cross stitches MUST go in the opposite direction.



TIPS: For an even stitching effect when stitching on gingham, make sure all your stitches come up or go down in the same corner hole as the previous row. The cross stitches touch at the corners.

Remember not to pull your stitches too tight but lay your thread on the fabric. Pulling tightly will leave a jumbled mess when you remove your hoop. Fabric and thread should be equal which requires a gentle touch and not a forceful pull.

The stylized Maple Leaf pattern below is a smaller version you might like to repeat along the edges of your work.



This pattern is provided by the Tangled Threads chapter in Nanaimo, BC for your stitching pleasure! Many thanks to Tangled Threads for sharing this wonderful pattern with us. They tried out this pattern at a Community Stitch-In on June 17th.

TRY A NEW STITCH...LONG LEGGED CROSS STITCH

This stitch is also known as the Long-armed Cross Stitch. This stitch is different from regular cross stitch in that it starts from the left and continues to the right. Also, one of the crossing stitches is worked over double the number of threads of the other stitch.

Bring needle and thread up at 1, count over 8 threads to the right and up two threads and go down at 2. Come up at 3, two threads down from 2, and go down at 4.

This is charted over 8 and 4 threads, but it can also be down over 6 and 3 or 4 and 2 threads. Try the different sizes to see how they look.

CROSS STITCHER'S SURPRISE SERIES

APRIL - SPRING HARE



If you don't want to use the Rainbow Gallery fibres, stitch these with regular embroidery floss or #8 perle coton. The colours are given so you have an idea what colours to use.

You can also use beads, metallic threads or choose whatever colours you want. Make these little pieces your own! Stitch Count: 44h x 44w—approximately 3" H x 3" W 28 ct Old Lace Country French linen from Wichelt (#86-269) stitched over two or 14 ct Old Lace Country French Soft Touch Aida (#367-269).



Rainbow Gallery Fibers - 1 card each

- AP50 Petite Alpaca Medium Cocoa 1 strand
- D72 Designers Dream Pale Rose 1 strand
- H609 Hi-Lights Pale Pink 1 strand

- P47 Pebbly Perle[®] Dark Chocolate 2 ply
- S932 Splendor[®] Lite Blue Violet 2 ply
- S992 Splendor[®] Pale Sea Green #1 − 2 ply

After completing all cross stitches, back stitch with 1 strand Pale Pink Hi-Lights around the edge of the main design area as indicated by the solid line on the chart. Also make long stitches of 1 strand Medium Cocoa Petite Alpaca for the whiskers. Attach the butterfly charm at the large 'X' to the left of the heart with some Lite Blue Violet Splendor[®]. (charm #80177AS from By Jupiter!)

MAY - BRIGHT FLOWER



Stitch Count: 44H x 44W—approximately 3" H x 3" W

28 ct. Old Lace French linen from Wichelt (#86-269) stitched over two or 14 ct Old Lace Country French Soft Touch Aida (#367-269).

Rainbow Gallery Fibers – 1 card each

- H623 Hi-Lights Yellow Pearl 1 strand 1
- M806 Mandarin Floss Dark Dusty Rose 2 ply
- P72 Pebbly Perle[®] Grass Green 2 ply
- SK23 Sparkle! Braid Iris 1 strand
- S800 Splendor[®] Cool White 2 ply S801 Splendor[®] Black 2 ply



After completing all cross stitches, backstitch with 2 ply Dark Dusty Rose Mandarin Floss around the edge of the main design area as indicated by the solid line on the chart. Attach the ladybug charm in the ower left, under the leaf, with black Splendor[®]. (Charm #12028BR from By Jupiter!)

JUNE - STRAWBERRY



Stitch Count—44 H x 44 W—approximately 3" H x 3" W

28 ct Antique Gold Country French linen from Wichelt (#86-270) stitched over two or 14 ct Antique Gold Country Fench Soft Touch Aida (#367-270).

Rainbow Gallery Fibers - 1 card each

- ▷ E800 Elegance[™] Cool White 1 strand
- FZ23 Fuzzy Stuff Gold 1 strand
- M809 Mandarin Floss Ruby Red 2 ply
- ✗ RT38 Rainbow Tweed Olive − 1 ply
- S860 Splendor[®] Lite Sky Blue 2 ply
- S861 Splendor[®] Wedgwood 2 ply
 PB07 Treasure Braid Petite[™] Red 1 strand

After completing all cross stitches, backstitch with 1 ply Olive Rainbow Tweed around the edge of the main design area as indicated by the solid line on the chart. Use 1 strand Red Petite Treasure Braid to make Rhodes stitches over 4 threads within the strawberry. Use 1 plys Olive Rainbow Tweed to



satin stitch the insides of the leaves. If you are stitching on Aida and have trouble with these extra stitches, you may fill these areas with cross stitches instead. Attach the dragonfly charm with Wedgwood Splendor[®] just under the strawberry stem where indicated on the chart. (charm #12129BR from By Jupiter!)

ELEANOR THOMAS YOUTH AWARD







The deadline for the Eleanor Thomas Youth Award (ETYA) is October 31st. To apply for the Award, you must be a member in good standing with EAC, aged 9-21 years (for the Seminar Sponsorship, aged 14-21 years) and be a Chapter or National member. You may request the Award for more than one category at a time and may receive the Award more than once. You may also apply for the Award as reimbursement of a completed category, with receipts. You are also required to abide by the requirements pertaining to the particular category.

Book Purchase—Youth members may request funds to purchase a book for their personal use and ownership. The basis for this purchase would be that the member wishes to use it for research for an embroidery project, as an aid for a course/class, or to assist with designing their own projects. The Youth member is required to write a book review with an overview of the book and include how it was used and how it benefited the member. The review will be published in *Youth Embroiderers' News* and/or *Embroidery Canada*.

Chapter Book Purchase—Books purchased for Chapter use with ETYA funds will remain in the Chapter library until such time that the Chapter disbands, when the book(s) become the property of EAC. The books may remain in the sponsoring Chapter library or sent to the Leonida Leatherdale Needle Arts Library at EAC expense.

Correspondence Courses - Youth members may request funds to cover the course fees only to take a Youth Embroiderers' Correspondence Course or an EAC Group Correspondence Course. A group can be one person. The Youth Chapter can also apply to take a correspondence course together. The Youth Chapter/Youth Member will submit the name(s), age(s) and Chapter name of all prospective students, the specific course requested and the amount of the course fees. Each Youth member is responsible for paying for all course materials and the postage to and from the counsellor for forwarding the required embroidery at the required times. ETYA funds are not to be used for this.

Workshop—The award funds may be used by a Youth Chapter/Youth Member to attend an EAC/Guild workshop. The application will include the name of the workshop, an outline of the class and the fee being requested. An explanation of how this workshop will benefit the Chapter/Youth Member is to be submitted on the application form.



Seminar Sponsorship—The award funds may be used by a Youth Embroiderer (between the ages of 14-21) to attend the annual national EAC Seminar. The money will be used to offset the cost of the course(s), kit(s) and accommodation fees.

Each application must be endorsed by the Chapter leader or parent of the Youth member who will act as a liaison between the counsellor and the applicant. Each Youth member agrees to complete the course within the required time. Download a copy of the application forms from the EAC website at www.eac.ca—Youth—Youth Resources— Eleanor Thomas Youth Award. The applications are all listed easily for downloading. I have sent the application forms and criteria to the Youth Leaders, so you can also ask them for a copy.



EAC CHALLENGE AND EXCHANGE



Information on where to send the entry forms and entries will be posted on the EAC website by September 1, 2017.

The information will be on the members' only section of the website so if you haven't already, sign up with your own personal username and password.

The 5th Annual EAC Winter Ornament Exchange

hosted by Gulip Gree Needlearts, Chatham-Kent, Ontario. Open to all EAC members.

Before Nov. 1, 2017 send your stitched ornament (limit two per member) and you'll receive the same number back in time for the holidays! It can be your own design or from a published pattern.

To take part, stitch a winter ornament. It can be multi-dimensional, beaded or flat as long as you plan ahead for postage requirements. Use an appropriate container for the size and shape of your ornament, e.g., padded envelope.

Once you've completed your ornament, here's what to do:

- Attach your name and contact information to your ornament and send it with a second appropriately sized stamped envelope (one envelope to send yours in, and another envelope for yours to go to its recipient). Check the postage carefully - be generous with the stamps on the second envelope (www.canadapost.ca). Remember it could go across 13 provinces and territories!
- Include a mailing/shipping label with your name and address this will be affixed to the ornament coming to you.
